# Neighborhoods Committee Awards Grant to MLNA

The city's Neighborhood Grant Program provides annual grants "to help resident-based groups carry out programs and activities designed to improve participation and neighborhood conditions." At the June 13 Neighborhoods Committee meeting, MLNA board members Tricia DelGaudio, Andre Valente, and Marilyn Gildea were gratified to learn that the MLNA was awarded the full grant amount, \$2,000. We receive the funds after MLNA Treasurer Andre Valente submits receipts for this year's block parties and Ice Cream Social.

# MV Police: Have Block Parties and Don't Leave WiFi on in Car

At our May 29 annual meeting, guest speakers Community Services Officer Jodie Pierce and Sgt. Wahed Magee from the MVPD spoke about safety.

They mentioned the importance of block parties, which encourage neighbors to know and to watch out for each other. Officer Pierce said that 40% of the block parties held in Mountain View are in Monta Loma.

Sgt. Magee stressed the importance of reducing theft from vehicles. If a laptop, iPad, or mobile device is not completely shut down, it constantly looks for WiFi, and burglars use devices that can detect them. Rental cars and Teslas are prime targets for auto burglaries. Parking lots are prime car-burglary spots, so your items should be put in the trunk before reaching your destination.

The Benjamin block party was held in June, and the Mardell party was on the Fourth of July with a decorated-bikes parade. Three other streets' parties are already planned. Has your block set its party date?

Many parties are held after school reopens when families are back from vacation. But it's not too early to set your street's party date now, and apply for a permit if you want to block off your street. You need to allow 30 days for the City to process your permit application.

A block party is great way to meet your neighbors, build the friendships that help keep our neighborhood safe, and compile a list of contact information to share. To promote these goals, the MLNA will help pay for your party. Everything you need to know to plan your party (and get reimbursed up to \$150) is at montaloma.org/events/block-parties/. Scroll to the bottom of the page for a printable copy.

"Road Closed" signs and orange safety cones are available for loan by CERT. There are enough cones for two parties held on the same day, but there are only two Road Closed signs. To ensure that these will be available when you want them, let CERT's John Thomas (johnt589@comcast.net) know as soon as you've set your date.

## Keeping Monta Loma Clean and Green

Remember what goes in which bin: mvrecycle.org

**Repair instead of Replace**: Visit the Repair Cafe in Mountain View on August 24 at the MV Senior Center to fix what needs fixing—repaircafemv.org

#### Walkable Sidewalks:

- Please trim your greenery back to the full width of the sidewalk and to a height of seven feet, as required by city code.
- Please keep weeds under control, especially those nasty foxtails that get into our pets' toes, ears, and noses.
- Sweep sidewalks after mowing weeds.

#### Dogs:

- Monta Loma Park fields and school grounds are off limits to dogs during school hours. Pick up dog messes deposited at other times.
- Pick up droppings from yards.
- Please don't deposit doggie bags in neighbors' trash cans after they've been emptied.
- Incontinent dogs should be walked in the gutter, not on sidewalks.

#### Street sweeping:

- Help the sweeper clean your gutter by moving your vehicles and trash bins off the street the evening before the second and fourth Thursdays of each month.
- Cars should be moved by 6:00 a.m.
- Upcoming street sweeping dates: 8/8, 8/22, 9/12, 9/26, 10/10, 10/24.
- If you have tenants who park on the street, please keep them informed of dates as well.

**Moving out?** Go to HHW.org or call (408) 299-7300 for a list of household hazardous waste collection options.

Moving in? If you found unwanted household chemicals in your new house, visit or call HHW to find nearby household hazardous waste drop-off locations.

#### Aw, Rats, We Have Rats!

Please don't poison pets in trying to rid your yard of rats. We can all share the stories—that beautiful tomato with a nibble out of it, a sweet orange with the peel eaten clean off, and droppings to sweep up behind your BBQ, all evidence of RATS. But if you put out poison, the rat eats it, and then your cat catches the rat... it might mean too bad for the rat, and the cat. Let's do our best to manage the things the rats like most about Monta Loma: plentiful food and good hiding places.

- 1. Keep your compost secure, and don't leave tempting fruit on the trees/vines.
- 2. Seal your house. Fill even the smallest holes with screens, steel wool, screws, whatever they can't chew through.
- 3. Bait multiple traps, multiple nights. Be vigilant and consistent. Cheese and peanut butter work well.
- 4. Get a pet that likes to catch rats. Garden cats are an option, as are barn owls (install an owl box to give them a nice home).

- 5. Block drains, pipes, gutters, vents with water-permeable steel wool or screens.
- 6. Trim up and back dense vegetation. "Rat City" is what my kids like to call ivy and juniper bushes.

#### Milkweed for Monarch Butterflies

After much discussion on the MLN email list, it's clear that this neighborhood really cares about their monarchs. This is a good thing, given that the monarch population has declined 99.4% since the 1980s. A visit to the local nursery can be confusing when you're looking for a treat to help build up our local monarch butterfly population. Advice from the Santa Clara County Master Gardeners indicates that the best variety of milkweed for local monarchs is *Asclepias fascicularis* (narrow leaved) or *Asclepias speciosa* ("Davis" or "showy," both broader leaved). These plants can be found at Summer Winds or other local garden centers with CA natives.

Best is to steer clear of the tropical varieties (*Asclepias curassavica*) since they do not die back in fall and therefore can end up spreading a parasite if the monarchs don't migrate when the plants die back. Since native milkweeds die back after blooming, the parasite dies along with them. This ensures that the next season's monarchs are feeding on fresh (non-infested) growth.

A helpful resource with information about saving the monarchs is the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation.






