PG&E has been telling us for months that we may lose power due to a Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS). If not a PSPS, then surely storms, rodents, or old equipment will have the same result. Are you ready? Do you know what to do to stay safe and comfortable? What if you need power for medical reasons?

There are links for everything from general information to what should respirator users and dialysis patients do. Prepare now, so an inconvenience doesn't become an emergency.

Monta Loma CERT will be getting ready for PSPSs by participating in a city-wide drill on November 16. The scenario will be a winter storm with power outage. You may see CERT members walking the streets in their hardhats and green vests checking out the power lines. Prevent Holiday Thefts


With the holidays approaching, we can expect a spike in package thefts. Take steps to avoid having deliveries loiter unattended on your doorstep. If you can, have packages delivered to your work, or utilize delivery lockers that some retailers offer. Many package deliveries offer detailed tracking information and delivery preference options so that you can make sure you or a trusted neighbor can secure a package soon after it's delivered.

Visit tinyurl.com/prvntthft for tips to prevent package thefts. A link to the MVPD's tip sheet on how to prevent burglaries in your home and vehicle is at tinyurl.com/mvpdtips and also at montaloma.org on the Neighborhood Watch page (under MLNA).

Take care to avoid leaving obvious signs that you're not home, such as empty trash bins at the curb. If you leave before your bins are emptied, ask a neighbor to roll them off the street. If you have home security cameras, include in the coverage area any area where you expect packages to be left.

Thefts from vehicles continue, so avoid leaving valuables in yours, and always lock it. The police

urge you to call whenever you see anything that seems suspicious. For emergencies and in-progress incidents, call 911. For other matters, suspicious circumstances, or crimes

Keeping Monta Loma Clean and Green

Street sweeping:

- Help the sweeper clean your gutter by moving your vehicles and trash bins off the street the evening before the second and fourth Thursdays of each month. This is especially important in fall and winter months as leaves can build up in the gutters and block our storm drains.
- Cars should be moved by 6:00 a.m.
- Upcoming street sweeping dates: 12/12, 12/26, 1/9, 1/23, 2/13, 2/27, 3/12. Note there is no cleaning on Thanksgiving day, so please keep an eye out for clogged storm drains during that period.
- If you have tenants who park on the street, please keep them informed of dates as well.



Walkable Sidewalks:

- Please trim shrubs back to the full width of the sidewalk and to a height of seven feet, as req'd by city code.
- Keep sidewalks clear of fallen leaves, especially after rain for the safety of pedestrians.
- Sweep sidewalks after trimming or mowing.

Dogs:

- Monta Loma Park fields and school grounds are off limits to dogs during school hours. Pick up dog messes deposited at other times.
- Pick up droppings from yards.
- Please don't deposit doggie bags in neighbors' trash cans after they've been emptied.
- Incontinent dogs should be walked in the gutter, not on sidewalks.






