Neighborhood Watch - Prevent burglaries, package thefts

A neighbor returning home was surprised to find that her empty trash bin had been moved from the curb to the side of her garage. This neighborly act helps prevent burglaries and package thefts because bins left at the curb and no cars in the driveway indicate to thieves that no one is home. One home-security video shows a car stopping at, and the woman passenger walking up to, only those homes with bins at the curb and an empty driveway.

Thefts from vehicles continue, so avoid leaving valuables in yours, and always lock it. Some arrests have been made, thanks to alert bystanders. The police urge you to call whenever you see anything that seems suspicious. For emergencies and in-progress incidents, call 911. For non-emergencies, suspicious circumstances, or crimes that have already occurred, call 903-6395, which you should have in your cell phone.

The Rails Project

Google contractors have been working on the new pedestrian/bike crossing at Victory/Middlefield/Rock that will connect the Rails site (on Mayfield) with the Permanente Trail next to Crittenden Middle School. A push button will activate flashing lights to stop traffic so you can cross to the Middlefield median, where you push another button to cross to the other side.

On Jewell and Montecito at Rengstorff, the current lanes will be re-striped to fit in a bike lane in the center of the street and to create a protected bike waiting area (bike box) in front of cars. Street parking on Jewell and Montecito nearest Rengstorff will be removed. The streets are already marked to show where the new lanes will go, and "No Right on Red" signs are up. Shared lane and green conflict markings are also planned for Rock/Rengstorff.

Dogs: Monta Loma Park fields and school grounds are off limits to dogs during school hours. Pick up dog messes deposited at other times. Please don't deposit doggie bags in neighbors' trash cans after they've been emptied. Incontinent dogs should be walked in the gutter, not on sidewalks.

Walkable Sidewalks: If your greenery is hampering passersby, please trim it back to a height of seven feet and the full width of the sidewalk.

Hazardous waste: Visit hhw.org or call 408-299-7300 to make an appointment to drop off your household hazardous waste and e-waste. Go to paintcare.org/locator/ for stores accepting leftover paint. Invite neighbors to help fill your trunk.

Bulky trash: Go to goo.gl/Ka9Que for On Call Plus pickup info.

Street sweeping: Help the sweeper clean your gutter by moving your vehicles and trash bins off the street the evening before the second and fourth Thursdays of each month.

Trash and recycling bins should be out of sight except within 24 hours of pickup time.

Paper shredding March 18

The next shredding opportunity is on Saturday, March 18, 8:00 to noon at the SMaRT Station, 301 Carl Rd. in Sunnyvale. You may want to arrange a carpool via the mln email list. See mvrecycle.org and click on Events, or call 903-6311.

If you shred at home, please put the shreds in paper bags, stapled shut, so they won't litter the street when the recycling cart is emptied.




