


Beautify Monta Loma spreads beauty and good cheer

The Beautify Monta Loma and Garden Tour on April 27, a cool and cloudy Sunday morning, was a resounding success. The seedling giveaway was held on Jennifer's patio, and attendees had their choice of vegetables (tomatoes, squash, cucumber), herbs (parsley, cilantro or basil), or flowers, which were also very popular. In addition to the seedlings raised by the committee (Olga, Jennifer, Karla, and Cheryl), many neighbors, including Jim, brought some to donate.

At 11 am, many neighbors joined the garden tour, which had been designed by Karla, who is a master gardener and currently leads our Garden Club.

We began at Maria's garden, which was a delight with its emphasis on colorful drought-tolerant plants offering year-round beauty and easy maintenance featuring fuschias, monkey flowers, and herbs.

A few steps away was Natalia's vibrant garden which highlighted California native plants well suited to our Mediterranean climate. Natalia is a landscape architect and principal founder of studiogreensquare.com. She has selected colorful Mediterranean



Next we walked to Jackie's garden, which focused on edible plants that are also decorative. She uses an artichoke both for eating and to allow the plant to go to flower, with its attractive purple flowers.

Then we visited Scott's garden, which was recently featured in the 2025 Growing Natives Garden Tour. He does not have an irrigation system because his garden of cactus and native plants uses such little water.

The tour finished near Monta Loma Park at Leslie's garden, which has many inviting nooks. Her recirculating waterfall is surrounded by plants, making it a perfect place to enjoy a book or a moment of contemplation.





Enjoy hiking or biking and nature?

If you enjoy hiking, biking, or horseback riding, come and explore Midpeninsula Regional Open Space Preserves!

Midpen, for short, has approximately 70,000 acres in San Mateo and Santa Clara counties and some 250 miles of trails. There are 27 Open Space Preserves and currently 25 are open to the public for free, from dawn to dusk daily. The goal of Midpen is to pre-



serve natural habitats for people to enjoy without harming the animals and plants that live there. There are many scenic landscapes to choose from, including coastal grasslands, redwood forests, chaparral, and wetlands. Some of the most popular preserves are Rancho San Antonio, Russian Ridge, Skyline, La Honda, and Purisima Creek.

You can choose a trail to hike, bike, or equestrian ride with your friends. The website openspace.org lists trails and which are designated for each activity. Check out the **Event Calendar** to join an activity led by a docent. As you will see, there are numerous opportunities to go on a short or long hike with a docent. Each hike has a different theme depending on the docent and the time of year. There is a lot of choice!

For children and the young at heart, the Daniels Nature Center is located next to Alpine Pond in Skyline Ridge Preserve. It has stuffed birds of prey and local animals for children to touch, a gopher snake, and examples of tarantulas and a number of insects. Leaflets about the Midpen preserves are also available.

There are also opportunities to volunteer either by restoring habitat, weeding out non-native plants, or, if you are interested in learning more about the native habitats and ecology, you can apply to train to become a docent!

Walkable Sidewalks

If your greenery is too robust, please trim it back across the full width of the sidewalk and to a height of at least seven feet, and encourage your neighbors to do the same.



Police Chief briefs neighborhood on crime prevention and department initiatives

Mountain View Police Chief Mike Canfield and his team met with neighborhood residents on March 26. More than 50 neighbors came to hear their presentation at Monta Loma Elementary School. Many thanks to Steve Schmidt, from whose notes this was compiled.

Report every crime. If in doubt, report it. If a crime is not reported, the police aren't aware of it and can't do anything to prevent additional occurrences. Call the Non-Emergency dispatch, 650-903-6344, and let MVPD decide. File online if you don't want to make a phone call. They stressed that you never know when someone acting strangely or committing a minor offense may be connected to something that happened elsewhere.

Home burglaries happen mainly at homes clearly not occupied. Use lights on timers and/or leave radio or TV on when away so your house doesn't appear to be vacant. If possible, install cameras and motion-activated lights. Add anti-shatter/security window film to sliding glass doors, which are often smashed for access. Although it doesn't prevent access, the film will hold the glass together, and slow thieves, possibly causing enough hassle that they leave. Lock your gates to slow down would-be thieves.

Catalytic converter thefts continue. The main target is Prius, which are more accessible and contain more precious metal. There's no pattern to the thefts, so it's difficult to catch the thieves. There are no good solutions, other than the guards that can be welded on, but they may only slow the thieves.

Bike thefts are mainly from open garages and/or unlocked bikes. Recording the serial number, having photos to prove ownership, and installing AirTag or other brands of GPS tags all helps get your bike back to you if recovered.

Free Bike Registration Program

To encourage you to register your bike, I have created a Monta Loma group account to register bikes with bikeindex.org and place a QR sticker on your bike(s). If the bike is found, anyone with a smartphone can quickly determine whether it has been reported as stolen, and reunite the bike with its owner. CPTED (Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design) can lead to reduced crime. There was interest to have future sessions (possibly at block parties) to learn what we can implement in Monta Loma, especially for our types of houses. ALPRs (Automated License Plate Readers) are cameras that scan license plates for stolen vehicles and persons of interest, but do not capture picture of driver or other information. Cameras are networked so they can track travel path.

MVPD's Transparency Dashboard shows crime data by type of incident. City data is divided into four beats, with Monta Loma in Beat 3. Dashboard data is interactive and can be filtered in various ways.

Volunteer opportunities at Filoli

BIRDING IN MONTA LOMA

Nests and baby birds

Our temperate climate encourages many of our neighborhood birds to raise their families on our homes and in our yards. Now is the time of year to watch for birds carrying twigs, string, leaves, etc. in their bills and see where they land. This will often be a nest site. Quietly watch the trees, bushes, and your house for birds returning to the same spot over and over. This often indicates a nest. Repeated twittering coming from the same spot all day long usually indicates hungry baby birds.

Once you locate a nest, watch it from afar to keep from disrupting the parents' brooding and feeding patterns. Watching baby birds sleeping, squawking for food, and being fed offers hours of enjoyment for your entire family. If you are lucky, you may even witness a baby bird's first attempt to fly. Once baby birds have left their nests, you still may see and hear them squawking in your trees, demanding food from their devoted parents, who often continue to feed them for a time after fledging (leaving the nest.)

Many birds have nested in our yard. Anna's hummingbirds have created their small, cup-shaped nests of plant down, feathers, and spiderwebs at eye level on branches of our cedar and plum trees. House finches repeatedly build their cupshaped nests of twigs, grass, leaves, and miscellaneous junk in the 3" clearance atop our outdoor lights below the eaves of our Eichler, or in the cups of our rain chains. A determined Mourning Dove raised clutch after clutch of babies in a hanging planter outside our kitchen window one year, undeterred by a feral cat who occasionally made dinner of her offspring. She simply landed in the planter, settled down, and laid more eggs each time, without bothering to build a nest! The Dark-eyed Junco who have since built their nest in the same hanging planters have given much more time to camouflaging the location of their sturdy nests.

Over the forty-six years I've lived on Richard Court, I have purchased and hung a variety of nest boxes (birdhouses) in our yard, nailed to our tree trunks, hanging from branches, and nailed to our house. Not all species of birds will use nest boxes or cavities in trees. The ones who do are called Cavity Nesters. Over the years, Chestnut-backed Chickadee, Bewick's Wren, Oak Titmouse, and White-breasted Nuthatch have nested in our bird boxes. Both Tree Swallow and Western Bluebird have inspected our bird boxes, but neither has yet nested there. At other times of the year, Nuttall's Woodpecker as well as White-breasted Nuthatch have slept overnight in one or another of our bird boxes. If you decide to install a bird box, choose or build one without a perch, and with an opening 1"-1.5" diameter. Otherwise, predators will have easy access to eggs and baby birds!

Please remember, now is NOT the time to trim your trees and hedges. Active nesting takes place January through August. Except for emergency tree work to correct a hazard, the best time to trim or remove trees and hedges is September through December.

(CERT) steps in! We're a group of Monta Loma residents trained to assist during emergencies, from providing first aid to communicating neighborhood needs to Mountain View's Emergency Operation Center. Many of us have taken the city's free CERT training, learning skills such as light search and rescue and damage assessment. CERT teams have made a real difference elsewhere—as during the 2025 Southern California wildfires, where volunteers helped distribute supplies and support shelters in hard-hit areas such as Malibu. Our team has been steady for years, but we need new folks—especially younger ones —to keep Monta Loma ready.

We know life's busy, and monthly meetings might feel like a lot. But joining CERT doesn't mean you need to be a superhero! Whether you're 25 or 85, any time or skill you bring makes our 1,000-home community stronger. You'll learn practical skills, connect with neighbors, and help us prepare for the unexpected. We practice through city-wide drills twice a year and smaller neighborhood exercises, so you'll feel confident stepping up when it counts.

Come check us out at one of our meetings held on the second Saturday of every month at our trailer at the Monta Loma Elementary School (460 Thompson Ave). Peek inside our trailer to see the cool emergency gear we've got to support our community—including first-aid kits and radios. 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South Bay Ceramics - Pottery Studios near Monta Loma

My kids (ages 6, 7, and 9) and I have been watching the British reality competition show *The Great Pottery Throwdown* since the start of the year, which inspired me to look for a local pottery studio. To my surprise, a quick search showed that there are two pottery studios right near our neighborhood. South Bay Ceramics opened its first studio at 1954 Old Middlefield Way (right before the South 101 exit) in 2022, and then opened a second studio location at 2485 Old Middlefield Way last year because of the demand. The new location is right next to our neighborhood, behind the Artisan Wine Depot.

Both studios offer a variety of wheel-throwing and hand-building classes. Although there are one-time classes, most classes are 6-week workshops, organized by skill levels from beginner to advanced. I completed the beginner session at their original location, and am now repeating that same beginner session with a different instructor at the location closer to Monta Loma, which is just a convenient 5-minute walk from my house.

The workshops come with access to Open Studio hours, which vary by day. I go to Open Studio hours an additional two or three times a week to practice the skills I've been taught in class. Throwing pottery is definitely much harder than it looks on television, and I've been humbled by the experience. It's been such a treat to spend time on a tactile craft, learn a new skill, and see improvement with practice.

If you've ever been curious about ceramics or if it's a skill you want to pick back up, check out their website at southbayceramics.com, or simply take a walk and stop by the studio.

Gardening Corner: Green Hints

Drought tip (May-August): Skip the fertilizer

Fertilizing your lawn and landscape typically promotes lush new growth—but during a drought, that's not what you want. New growth demands more

want. New growth demands more water, which can put additional stress on your plants when water is scarce. In fact, applying fertilizer to already drought-stressed plants can do more harm than good by pushing growth the plant can't sustain.



In some cases, plants naturally slow or pause their growth during drought conditions to conserve energy. Fertilizer won't be helpful in these situations, as the plants simply won't use it. During drought months, it's best to let your garden rest and focus on water-wise care instead.

Got a pond? Get free mosquitofish!


If you have a pond or any standing water on your property, the City of Santa Clara offers free mosquitofish (Gambusia affinis) to help control mosquitoes naturally. These



small freshwater fish are used by mosquito and vector control districts to eat mosquito larvae and pupae, making them an effective and eco-friendly method of mosquito prevention. Mosquitofish are easy to care for and typically don't require extra feeding in established ponds. They are available at no cost from February through October.
